Aliyah

Facilitate Increased Aliyah

Address the Aftermath of COVID-19

For Jewish communities struggling in the wake of the pandemic, using JReady (our online resource center for communitiy resilience) and our *Shlichut* (Israeli emissaries) network



Combine the efforts of JReady and Shlichim to strengthen community resilience

Employ Hybrid Models of Engagement

Maximize the impact of our core strategies — Partnership2Gether, Shlichut, Immersive Experiences and Peoplehood Education for Israelis — through new in-person and virtual models of engagement

A 2021 survey* on virtual engagement found that three quarters of respondents said they either will continue attending programs

Support Community Efforts to Fight Antisemitism

Utilize the global network of *Shlichim* (Israeli emissaries) as a resource for communities in their efforts to counter antisemitism and virulent anti-Israel sentiment. Provide small communities outside of North America with safety measures via the Security Assistance Fund



~1 in 4 Jews in the U.S. experienced antisemitism in 2021 and in the UK, by mid-2021, antisemitic incidents had increased by 49%

Strengthen Israeli Society

Cultivate Young Israeli Change Agents

Train post-high school Israelis during their gap year to become agents of change, working with teens from the socio-economic periphery

Assist At-Risk Populations

Help Israelis most impacted by COVID-19 get back on their feet, rehabilitating Israeli society

Continue to offer assistance to beneficiaries of our programs, including youth-at-risk, helping them survive and thrive post-crisis

Prepare for a Resurgence of Tension

Reinforce vulnerable facilities near the Gaza Strip, including absorption centers and Amigour housing, while supporting impacted families via the Fund for Victims of Terror

Promote Shared Society

Join efforts with local and governmental agencies to develop gap year programs for Arab Israelis utilizing our unique knowledge in developing and managing gap-year experiences and in working with teens.



Expand pipeline of gap-year participants

Support alumni of gap year programs as they transition to civilian life, academic studies and the job market



Through the national Youth Futures infrastructure serving thousands of families, identify and assist victims of domestic violence.



More shelters and protected spaces in 5+ Absorption Centers to accommodate all residents and keep them safe
